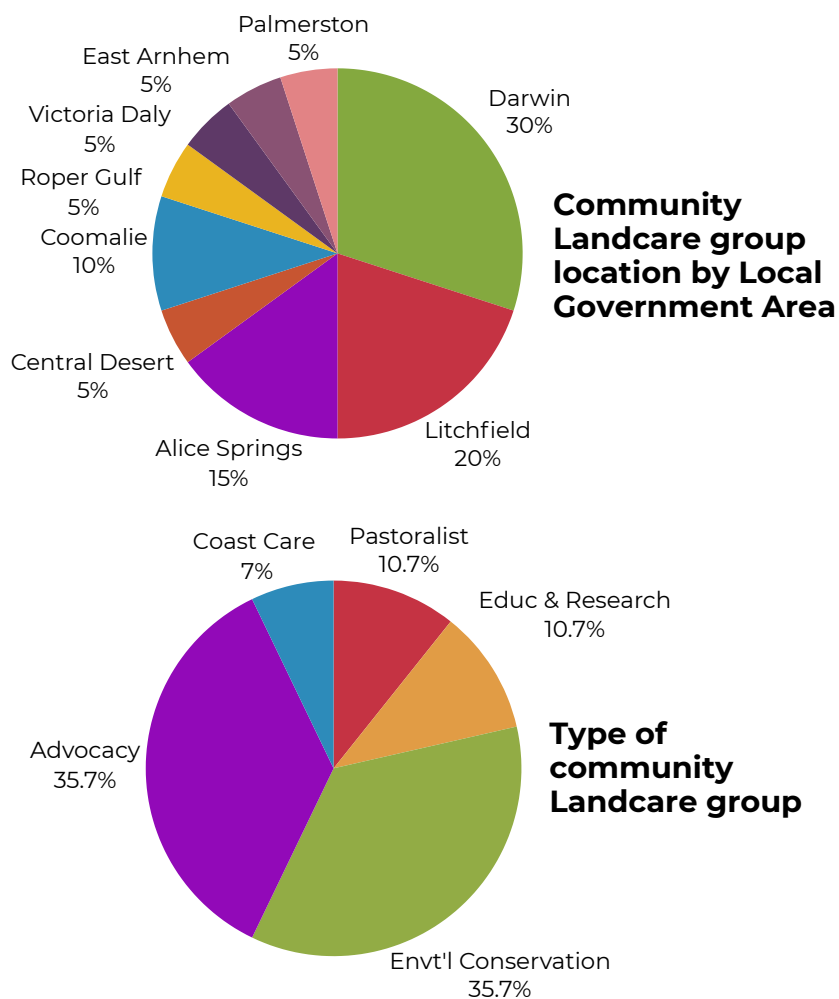
Through our member groups we represent

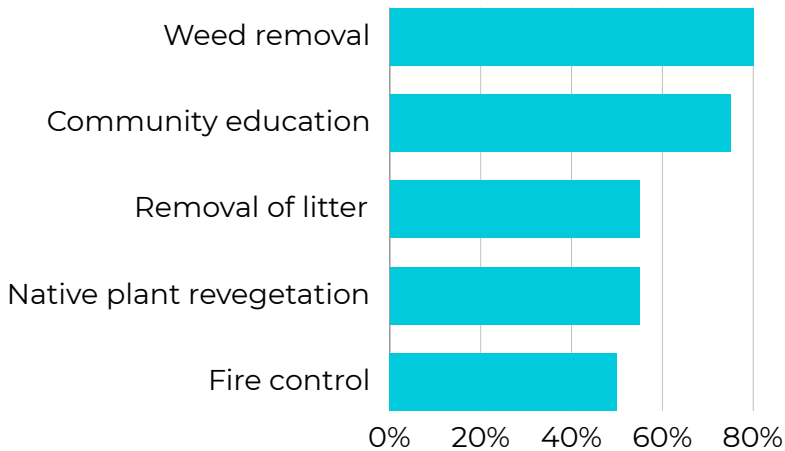
“

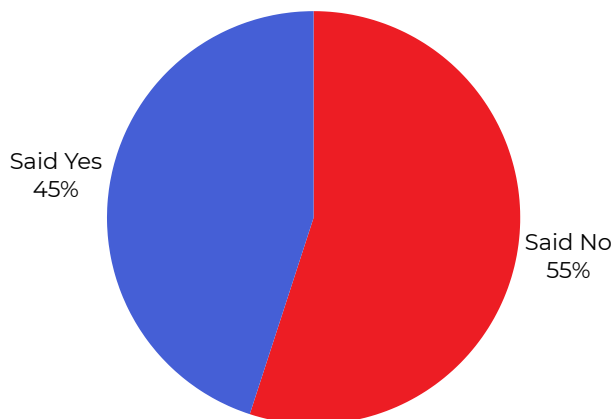

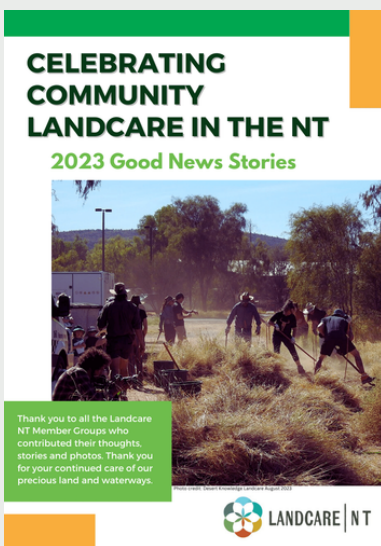


GOOD NEWS STORIES
